From The Vicar April 2017

The picture on the cover reminded me that we used to have a very vigorous Passion Flower (*Passiflora*) growing in one of our gardens – no matter how hard we cut it back it grew again with renewed strength. Perhaps that's why this flower (and its symbolism) is so appropriate for this time of year.

In the 15th and 16th centuries Spanish missionaries began to use the various parts of this flower to explain Christ's crucifixion.

So: The pointed tips of the leaves were taken to represent the Holy Lance. The tendrils represent the whips used in the flagellation of Christ. The ten petals and sepals represent the ten faithful apostles (less St. Peter who denied Jesus and Judas Iscariot the betrayer). The flower's radial filaments represent the crown of thorns. The chalice-shaped ovary with its receptacle represents a hammer or the Holy Grail. The 3 stigmata represent the 3 nails and the 5 anthers below them the 5 wounds (four by the nails and one by the lance). The blue and white colours of many species' flowers represent Heaven and Purity.

Like my passion flower the story of Christ's crucifixion has spread and spread, but Christians have an uphill battle at Easter – to some it's the greatest story ever told, to others the story can seem quite ridiculous. How on earth do you begin to explain that Jesus died, but then somehow came alive again, and indeed remains alive? It would in many ways be simpler to concentrate on the wonderful teachings of Jesus and his examples of how to live and love God. But if we did that then our Christian faith would be worthless. The faith of Christians depends on the resurrection of Jesus, and always has done, right from the earliest days. Jesus' followers claimed that they had met him, seen him and even talked with him. They were so certain of his 'resurrection' that nothing could deter them from talking about it with others. The witness of those early Christians has led many others to a true faith in Jesus Christ and a relationship with him that wouldn't make sense if he were dead.

Christians don't put their faith in a dead hero from the past, but in someone who is alive and active in their own lives and in the world. That, in a nutshell, is the real message of Easter and from which we, like the Passion Flower gain renewed strength.

What can I eat for Easter?

Can't eat beef.....mad cow.

Can't eat chicken..... bird flu.

Can't eat eggs..... Salmonella.

Can't eat pork.....fears that bird flu will infect piggies. Also trichinosis.

Can't eat fish..... heavy metals in the waters.

Can't eat fruits and veggies..... insecticides and herbicides.

Can't eat potatoes, pasta, bread, rice.....nasty carbs .

Hmmmmmmmm! I believe that leaves.....chocolate.

Our barn owls diet and hunting, they mainly feed on voles, mice and wood mice, shrews, brown rats and occasional frogs lizards. They swallow their prey whole, so them who keep an eye on them, look for the pellets to examine just what they have been eating, as there will be bits of bones in it.

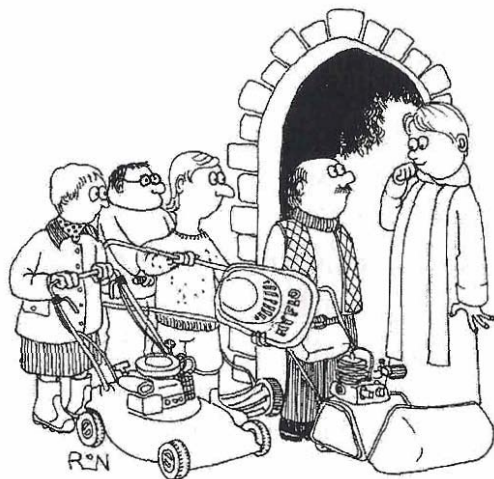
They are the silent hunters and they possess extremely acute hearing, and the feathers in owls have a comb like extension on the leading edge, with other birds it's smooth, in the owls part is rough, so this muffles the air passing through it. All flight feathers are also very soft, with tiny branches along the filaments which helps to muffle the sound. The only drawback, they are not very watertight so they must keep applying liberal amounts of preen oil from a gland on the upper base of the tail.

Now many farmers are putting up lots of nest box's for them, as a lot of the old farm buildings have been done up, so no home for them. I am sure we shall see more nest boxes for the owls going up.

Just a last note, give your garden birders a good wash out clean, don't do them in the washing up sink. I use a bucket of hot water
