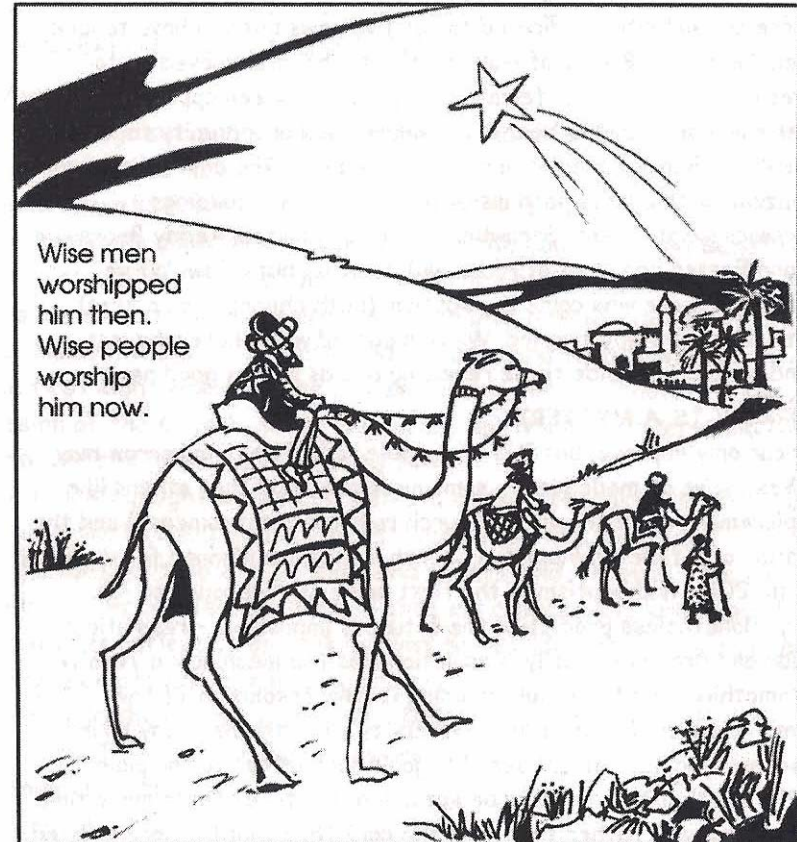

From the Vicar January 2015

YESTERDAY WAS HISTORY

How was 2014 for you? I would hazard a guess that it had as many ups as it did downs and some more memorable than others.

At this time of year we spend a lot of time looking backwards - reflecting on events that have shaped us and the world, as well as those people we consider to be worthy of recognition. The other day I was watching a programme on the UK's weirdest weather in 2014 - it seems that we in the East Riding escaped rather lightly. Events on the world stage have not been very uplifting - the many who died because of the Ebola epidemic, the atrocities of ISIS and this morning's news that 132 children and 9 adults killed by the Taliban in the name of God and supposedly in revenge for Malala Yousafzai winning the Nobel Peace Prize. Is there ever any good news we ask ourselves? It is to be found and there are websites dedicated to positive news but you have to look for them!! Both the Bishop of Hull and the Archdeacon moved on to pastures new, and the first female Bishop has just been appointed.

It is a recognised public ministry; in the Church of England which lay members of the Parish can be involved.

The RPA works from the Church with of the guidance of an ordained or responsible minister and works within the bounds of the Benefice. The Instruction for this course is arranged by the Diocese and consists of sixteen weeks and is divided into four disciplines which are Mission, Worship, Pastoral and Children and young persons.

The first eight weeks of the course cover a core unit covering the Mission of the Church, What is Church, Spirituality, Understanding ourselves and others and listening skills.

The following eight weeks concentrate on the specialist role chosen. I chose the Pastoral route the instruction for this, helps and encourages participants to think and understand, through listening, the emotions and feelings caused through changes and loss in our lives; encourages reflection and taking time to consider situations and how one may be effective in helping others.

- 5, Not a "dumping ground" for banks and other lenders to send their unprofitable customers to.

SO WHAT ARE THEY

1. A fairer alternative to profit motivated banks!
2. An organisation that helps it's members to manage their money.
3. An organisation that offers a large range of useful banking services within it's local community.
4. A locally based financial co-operative owned and run by it's members and dedicated to helping you to make the most of your money, not making money out of you!

WHAT CAN A CREDIT UNION PROVIDE?

Banking: Current account with a debit card that can be used at any Link point or Post Office.

Standing orders or Direct Debits

If you qualify for a normal Debit Card you use it exactly the same as any card from the big banks.

Savings: Instant access, Christmas saving account, Loyalty, Junior for children, Pennies 2 Pounds! A slightly higher interest rate than the big banks!

Loans: Freedom loan, Saver Loan, Dream Loan. A slightly lower rate than the big banks
