

From The Vicar March 2018

A Sunday school teacher asked her class, 'Can anyone tell me what you must do before you can obtain forgiveness of sin?' One small boy spoke up, 'Sin'!

By now we are well and truly into Lent—a time when we are asked to look at our lives in more detail and ask some important and often uncomfortable questions about ourselves and our relationship with God.

Lent began with a reflection on Jesus' temptations in the wilderness—it ends of course with the events of Holy Week and his crucifixion. Despite the fact that our world is different to that of the New Testament we are still called to treat people as Jesus did and to stand up for the values he embraced at all times. Jesus faced many of the same powers of darkness that we face and yet, strengthened by God, he emerges victorious. We are not alone as we walk in the way of the cross.

There is of course one bright spot in the middle of Lent – Mothering Sunday and I hope to see many of you at Mappleton on that day. Often this is referred to as Mother's Day (an Americanism) and is about a particular person – a mother. Mothering Sunday on the other hand is about a quality which we recognise in others who may or may not be our mothers.

'Mothering' means caring deeply, sustaining, supporting, whatever the cost. That is why God, whom we usually call 'Father', is sometimes spoken of in the Bible as 'mothering' us gathering us in His arms of love, even feeding us like a mother. On Mothering Sunday we celebrate so much more than our own mums. We celebrate the whole glorious notion of care compassion and nurture.

Mothering Sunday is also a reminder that Easter isn't far off - April 1st this year!!

The February meeting was held on the 5th and was attended by 16 members. We were pleased to welcome our guest speaker Margaret Knapton who told us about the important work carried out by the Fair Trade Organisation in poorer countries and how their input enabled farmers to obtain a fairer price for their produce, thus enabling them to support their families. A selection of items were available to purchase at very good prices. A VOT was given by Susan Ulph.

Future events arranged by the East Yorkshire Federation were discussed and 6 members booked to attend an afternoon CenTEAnery party in May in celebration of women attaining the right to vote in 1918., the event is to be held at All Saints Community Centre in South Cave.

Waders - Oystercatchers are very easily identified, with the pale pink legs & flight a white v rump and broad white wing bars. They like to feed on mudflats and damp fields. 13,000 breed in the UK & they are a very common winter vistor (340.000), Turnstones they are widespread & common locally, 50.000 come to our shores August to May time, they are blackish with a white chest & belly with bright orange legs. They mainly feed on Estuaries' sandy/stoney beaches. Their voice is a fast clipped "kew-tuk -tuk" if flushed out from cover or in danger.

Now the Avocet, adults are bright white, a curved black bands around white oval patch on closed wings and a unique upswept bill. It feeds in shallow water with regular sideswipes of it's beak on shallow lakes & estuaries.

Now the Dunlin, it's about the size of starling, with a long tapered bill to a downcurved tip. Food is picked up by a probing action, and runs quickly. Quite scarce and local breeders (9.000 pairs) June to July, but winter the numbers swell to 390.000. Like the rest of the waders, it feeds on mud flats & it nests on moors/hills up in North Yorks God bless Revd Anne, and all who read this John
